ANNUAL REPORT - 2016/2017

INTRODUCTION

International Studies (INTL) is an interdisciplinary and multi-disciplinary international program housed in the School of Languages, Cultures and World Affairs (LCWA). The INTL major, which formally began in fall 2010, is a significant step in the internationalization effort at the College. The major incorporates five concentrations, four focused on regions - Africa, Asia, Europe and Latin America and the Caribbean, and one “thematic” concentration - International Comparative Literature.

The faculty of International Studies currently consists of Douglas Friedman – Associate Professor of Political Science, who was moved from the Political Science Department to International Studies in fall 2010, Malte Pehl – tenured Associate Professor of International Studies hired for fall 2009, Kathleen Foody and Beatriz Maldonado Bird – both tenure track Assistant Professors of International Studies hired for fall 2012. Beatriz is a joint hire between Economics and International Studies. Amy Malek, was hired last year to fill a position that had been a visiting position for three years. During the 2016-2017 academic year we successfully hired Blake Scott, a Caribbeanist from the University of Texas at Austin, to replace Lisa Samuel. Also joining the program was visiting instructor Ali Demirdas, a University of South Carolina Political Science Ph.D. who specializes in the Middle East, adjunct Sarah Wuigk, who has an M.A. in Latin American Studies and History from the Free University of Berlin and who also serves as the administrative assistant, Brian Ganaway who is the International Scholars Program director taught INEU Introduction to Europe course as did Maksym Kovalov who has taught as an adjunct for the program for the last few years. Jason Taylor, a graduate of the College of Charleston who holds both a J.D. and Master’s degree in Latin American Studies from the University of Florida teaches courses about social movements and crime and law in Latin America for International Studies.

SEVENTH YEAR OF THE MAJOR NARRATIVE

The International Studies major in its seventh year has seen a light decline in the number of majors from 2014 in spring 2016 to 197 in spring 2017 – this after two consecutive years are large graduating classes – 58 in 2014-2015 and 66 in 2015-2016. Given the fairly large graduating class in 2017 – 59, growth of the major will probably remain flat in 2017-2018 – perhaps even decline a bit more before recovering. Still, it remains the overwhelmingly largest major in the School.

The number of INST minors decreased from 84 in spring 2016 to 81 in spring 2017.

While some recruiting was done – letters were sent to all students taking INTL 100 who earned a “B” or better, inviting them to declare the major or minor – we have not been as aggressive as in the previous years. Since it is apparent that one section of the INTL 495 capstone each semester is inadequate for the number of majors we continue to attract, we will continue to run one capstone class in fall and two in spring. The INTL 300 methods course will no longer be given – the very few students who will need it to graduate will have to complete it as an independent study.

The INTL program was not able to make a contribution to the First Year Experience program this academic year given all the changes in personnel which include a new tenure track assistant professor, a new visiting professor, the loss of Lisa Samuel, Malte Pehl’s sabbatical, and course release for Kathy Foody and Beatriz Maldonado Bird. However, we continued to support the Honors Program with Malte Pehl teaching HONS 173 – the Honors version of the Introduction to International Studies. INTL collaborates with the Honors program on the International Scholars Program. This program which started in fall 2012 is a unique program in which specially selected Honors students major in International Studies and one additional major. They receive special mentoring, a “May-Away” study abroad experience – which was organized by INTL and has already taken them to Cuba, France and India - and share a residence hall their first academic year. In this way INTL has developed a permanent relationship with the Honors Program. While Douglas Friedman teaches classes in the Political Science department, Beatriz Maldonado Bird teaches courses in the Economics department. Faculty from various departments at the College sponsor International Studies independent study and bachelor essay projects. In 2016-2017, Jacob Steere-Williams (History), Lisa Covert (History), Giovanna DeLuca (Italian Studies), and Yoshiki Chikuma (Asian Studies) sponsored INTL 400 Independent Study and INTL 499 Bachelor Essay projects.

Critical Issues

While the program has made great strides in its first seven years, several significant problems persist. First, as was pointed out for six years now, current College policy is to equate a concentration with a minor regarding the sharing of courses. Our major is essentially made up of concentrations so a student cannot share courses between most of this major and any minor – this is not the case with majors that do not have concentrations. This creates a disincentive for our majors to pick up a minor – particularly a language minor (which we are trying to encourage). I have taken this issue up with several College faculty committees and while there is general agreement that the policy is unfair, opposition has come principally from Academic Affairs. I hope that with some changes there recently, this issue can be resolved in a way that incentivizes greater international study – not less.

The second problem has to do with the organizational structure of International Studies. Over the last six years, Dean Cohen, former Dean Tillis, and now Interim Dean Johnson have supported INTL becoming a department (and, we had been told, Academic Affairs supported it as well). INTL is the only large major at the College not embedded in a departmental structure and suffers thereby. As a program, and not a department, INTL faculty do not receive Faculty Senate representation, the T & P process is fraught with difficulty, and it is accorded very little visibility on the LCWA website. INTL, with six faculty members, almost 200 majors and over 80 minors is considered too small for departmental status (like Classics, Religious Studies, German, Philosophy, Hospitality and Tourism Management, or the new Department of Finance). **Just this year, a Policy was put into effect which defined a Department as having at least 8 roster faculty or**

faculty lines. This Policy also grand-fathered in the departments previously mentioned as allowed to remain departments without conforming to the Policy. It is hard not to think that this Policy was created specifically for international Studies.

Up until spring 2015, all the statistics related to International Studies were reported as part of something called “International and Intercultural Studies” which included – International Studies and Asian Studies (which is basically Asian languages faculty). This is the reason we do not report the data provided by Institutional Research. It does not correctly reflect the effort of this program. Not until spring 2015 are the classes or faculty effort grouped together as “International Studies”, and even here there are gross problems. For example, the effort and classes of Beatriz Maldonado, Bird who holds a joint appointment in International Studies and Economics, are all reported with the Economics Department.

The third problem the program has been struggling with is the Degreeworks system. Degreeworks is apparently incapable of accommodating our major in a number of ways. This has led to our major being cited for excessive “exceptions” even though these “exceptions” are students following the requirements of the major. Over the last two years some improvement has been made particularly in accommodating special topics courses for International studies majors, but it seems rather silly to have to petition for an exception on your record when one is following the approved curriculum of your major. The inability of Degreeworks to properly reflect our students’ progress in their major is a major cause of the frustration and dissatisfaction they experience. We are told not to expect any improvement.

Particularly challenging for the Program in the next year will be transitioning to new leadership as the current director retires. The faculty’s expectations are that the next senior member of the faculty, Malte Pehl, will be appointed director and maintain continuity and progress for the Program. A successful transition will go a long way towards assuring the faculty and others at the College of the continued existence of the Program in the absence of its establishment as a department.

Assessment

This academic year is the first for our reformed Program assessment. Data is now gathered from courses where the great majority of the students are actually majors – INTL 350 and INTL 495 – as well as study abroad which is, uniquely at the College, an integral part of our curriculum. It certainly is too early to conclude anything based up the data collected thus far, but data collected with the IDI study abroad survey is suggestive with regard to the decision of the program faculty to restrict certain affiliate study abroad programs.

Strategic Plan

During the 2016-2017 academic year, the INTL faculty set out to develop the first strategic plan for the Program. Founded in 2010, the Program spent the last seven years refining and tweaking what had been developed by the multidisciplinary committee that created the major, particularly in light of the challenges raised by its unanticipated popularity. The Draft Strategic Plan for 2017-2022 (Appendix 1) sets out several goals of the International Studies Program aligned with the College’s Strategic Plan and develops appropriate measures to achieve those goals. These include creating a good connection with the large number of graduates the Program is generating; achieving

departmental status; and targeting new hires to address regions of the world neglected in the College curriculum.

Advising

With only six faculty members and almost 300 majors and minors, advising is a challenge for the Program. The major is complex – five concentrations which are in effect like five different majors, with their own specific language and study abroad requirements. The minor is less complex now that electives have been specified in the catalog, but so many special topics and study abroad courses can apply to make it complex again and require multiple meeting with faculty advisors. Some of the burden has been shouldered by faculty associated with the program who have particular expertise in concentrations. Lei Jin and Yoshiki Chikuma in Asian Studies together this year advised 12 majors who were doing significant work in Chinese and Japanese language study. Simon Lewis, the African Studies director advised 9 students in the Africa concentration while Bill Olejniczak, European Studies director and Martine Cuvillier-Hiers, Director of Comparative Literature, advised almost 20 students in those concentrations. This still leaves a significant burden on INTL faculty especially when minors are factored in. you will notice that the Program director currently advises all the INST minors and still INTL faculty have significant advising loads. Advising INTL majors and INST minors requires a good knowledge of the curriculum of the concentrations, the languages required by them, and the study abroad opportunities and restrictions for each. Faculty should have a multidisciplinary background – particularly some familiarity with the social sciences and history.

Curriculum

After several years of major revisions to the INTL curriculum, this academic year saw only fairly minor changes to the major. While it was anticipated that the Europe concentration might be less desirable because of the elimination of all pre-modern history and literature courses as well as all business-related courses, the number of majors increased – an excellent outcome. Several courses were added to the major core requirement choice of courses – RELS 215 Religion and Globalization and MUSC 233 World Music Cultures, as well as several courses to the Asia, Europe and Latin America and the Caribbean concentrations. A major change was made to the INST minor (need to try and re-align the acronyms) by adding the option to take three INTL courses rather than three regionally focused classes

Plans for the coming year include continuing work on one or two new concentrations for the INTL major. It was always anticipated when the INTL major was first conceived that there would be expansion in both the regionally focused and thematically focused areas. Student desire for a Middle East or Near East Concentration is expressed often as is an interest in a concentration focused on the Mediterranean region or cultural/historical area. Students have also expressed an interest in thematic concentrations like International Development. An effort will be made this year to develop a general “Global Issues” concentration that would be attractive to students who are not settled on a particular region of the world but have a passion for international affairs.

Teaching

As is fitting of an inter- and multi- disciplinary program, the faculty in International Studies

contributed to the curriculum of a number of departments as they fulfilled their obligation to the International Studies curriculum. INTL faculty taught International Studies, Political Science, and Economics courses. They also contributed to the Honors programs. Unlike most other majors, the faculty contributing to the major go far beyond the roster INTL faculty in the program and thus it is difficult to measure in the same way one would most other majors (courses from 26 departments and programs in 4 Schools). A list of courses the college offered that students in all concentrations could take to satisfy the major is included here.

Study Abroad

INTL is one of a very few majors that require students to study or intern abroad – therefore, 100% of graduating INTL majors have studied abroad. This year INTL formally specified what programs would be acceptable - for study abroad starting in fall 2016, students were limited to certain affiliate programs – CIEE, IES, ISEP, SFS School for Field Study, Arcadia University, Danish Institute for Study Abroad, IFSA-Butler, SACI – Studio Arts Centers International, SIT, and University of Southern Mississippi – all College semester and summer programs that are three weeks or longer in duration, and all College bi-lateral programs. This eliminated all for-profit programs and made monitoring and evaluating study abroad for our students much easier. We have also started to evaluate the study abroad experience, while also receiving feedback on the quality of programs, through our administering of the Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) which assesses intercultural sensitivity and global awareness. These choices were not well received by the Study Abroad director who is inordinately committed to the programs we restricted and were strongly questioned or opposed by Dean Tillis and several LCWA chairs whose programs do not require study abroad nor make it an integral part of their curriculum. In the end, the prerogative to approve study abroad programs for INTL majors, approved by the Faculty Senate when the INTL major was established, was confirmed.

Sarah Wuigk, our administrative assistant is continuing to develop INTL internships abroad. She is also developing a system to monitor when and where INTL students study abroad and procedures for better advising for study abroad.

Not surprisingly, a considerable number of INTL students studied abroad in 2016-2017 – **80** INTL majors studied abroad – that is 40.5 % of our majors.

INTL Students

INTL majors follow a common set of requirements for 15 hours of the major. The other 18 consist of courses in their concentrations. At the end of spring 2017, there were **197** declared majors: **84** *students were in the Europe concentration; 45 in the Latin America and the Caribbean concentration; 47 in the Asia concentration; 12 in the Africa concentration and 9 in the International Comparative Literature concentration.*

In spring 2017, 49 INTL majors (25% of all INTL majors), were in the Honors College – a number of majors second only to Biology's 108 (15% of all Biology majors).

The INST minor comprises 18 credit hours of which nine are taken in core required courses and nine are taken as electives which are directed toward a specific non-US geographic area. In spring 2017 there were **81** minors.

An “INTL Get Together” for all INTL majors was held on September 6, 2016 at the President’s Glebe Street Garden. Faculty from the International Studies program as well as affiliate faculty from all across the campus attended. This is one of the few ways that students in our interdisciplinary major can all get to know one another.

Extracurricular

INTL supported the Italian Film Festival - October 20-23, 2016 and sponsored two internships for students working with the festival.

INTL Graduates

A total of 59 students graduated with the INTL degree during the 2016-2017 academic year. This graduating class of INTL majors had a cumulative GPA of 3.204 and a GPA in the major of 3.237.

Out of a total 59 graduates, 38 had an overall GPA of 3.00 or higher (64%), 23 had an overall GPA of 3.50 or higher (39%), 38 had a major GPA or 3.00 or higher (64%), and 25 had a major GPA of 3.50 or higher (43%).

International Studies Alumni

With only seven years in existence, the International Studies Program does not have an old, established alumni. However, in a relatively short period of time it has graduated 297 students. While they may not be established in their life careers, what we have found is that they are pursuing their dreams and doing many interesting things.
