ANNUAL REPORT - 2017/2018

INTRODUCTION

International Studies (INTL) is an interdisciplinary and multi-disciplinary international program housed in the School of Languages, Cultures and World Affairs (LCWA). The INTL major, which formally began in fall 2010, was a significant step in the internationalization effort at the College. The major incorporates five concentrations, four focused on regions - Africa, Asia, Europe and Latin America and the Caribbean, and one “thematic” concentration - International Comparative Literature.

The faculty of International Studies currently consists of Douglas Friedman – Associate Professor of Political Science, who was moved from the Political Science Department to International Studies in fall 2010, Malte Pehl – tenured Associate Professor of International Studies hired for fall 2009, Kathleen Foody and Beatriz Maldonado Bird – both newly tenured Associate Professors of International Studies were hired in fall 2012. Beatriz is a joint hire between Economics and International Studies. Amy Malek was hired in 2016 to fill a position that had been a visiting position for three years. In 2017 we successfully hired Blake Scott, a Caribbeanist from the University of Texas at Austin, to replace Lisa Samuel and this year we hired Visiting Assistant Professor Jessica Price, a Latin Americanist with a Ph.D. in Government from the University of Texas at Austin to temporarily replace Douglas Friedman who is retiring. Also joining the program was visiting instructor Ali Demirdas, a University of South Carolina Political Science Ph.D. who specializes in the Middle East, adjunct Sarah Wuigk, who has an M.A. in Latin American Studies and History from the Free University of Berlin and who also serves as the administrative coordinator, and Maksym Kovalov, a University of Oklahoma Political Science Ph.D., who has taught as an adjunct for the program for the last few years taught INEU 101 Introduction to Europe course. Jason Taylor, a graduate of the College of Charleston who holds both a J.D. and Master’s degree in Latin American Studies from the University of Florida teaches courses about social movements and crime and law in Latin America for International Studies.

EIGHTH YEAR OF THE MAJOR NARRATIVE

The International Studies major in its eighth year has seen another slight decline in the number of majors from 1987 in spring 2017 to 180 in spring 2018 – this after three consecutive years of large graduating classes – 58 in 2014-2015 and 66 in 2015-2016, and 51 in 2016-2017. Given the fairly large graduating class in 2018 – 51, growth of the major will probably remain flat in 2018-2019 – perhaps even decline a bit more before recovering. Still, the INTL major remains the overwhelmingly largest major in the School of Languages, Cultures and world Affairs.

The number of INST minors decreased from 81 in spring 2017 to 70 in spring 2018.

While some recruiting was done – letters were sent to all students taking INTL 100 who earned a “B” or better, inviting them to declare the major or minor – we have not been as aggressive as in the previous years given the lack of resources allocated to the Program. Since it is apparent that one section of the INTL 495 capstone each semester is inadequate for the number of majors we continue to attract, we will run one capstone class in fall and two in spring.

The INTL program made a contribution to the First Year Experience program this fall with FYE 113 Economics of Globalization given by Beatriz Maldonado Bird. The Program continued to support the Honors Program with Malte Pehl teaching HONS 173 – the Honors version of the Introduction to International Studies. INTL collaborates with the Honors program on the International Scholars Program. This program which started in fall 2012 is a unique program in which specially selected Honors students major in International Studies and one additional major. They receive special mentoring, a “May-Away” study abroad experience – which has already taken them to Cuba, France, India, Estonia, and Ghana - and share a residence hall their first academic year. In this way, INTL has developed a permanent relationship with the Honors Program. In spring, Kathy Foody taught a Religious Studies course, RELS 235 Islamic Tradition, which was cross-listed with INTL 290. Douglas Friedman teaches classes in the Political Science department, Beatriz Maldonado Bird teaches courses in the Economics department. Faculty from various departments at the College sponsor International Studies independent study, internship and bachelor essay projects with INTL majors.

Critical Issues

While the program has made great strides in its first eight years, several significant problems persist. First, as has been pointed out for seven years now, current College policy is to equate a concentration with a minor regarding the sharing of courses. Our major is essentially made up of concentrations, so a student cannot share courses between most of this major and any minor – this is not the case with majors that do not have concentrations. This creates a disincentive for our majors to pick up a minor – particularly a language minor (which we are trying to encourage). We have taken this issue up with several College faculty committees and while there is general agreement that the policy is unfair, opposition has come principally from Academic Affairs which therefore seems to want to disincentivize international study.

The second problem has to do with the organizational structure of International Studies. Over the last seven years, former Dean Cohen, former Dean Tillis, and now Interim Dean Johnson have verbally supported INTL becoming a department (and, we had been told, Academic Affairs supported it at one time as well). INTL is the only large major at the College not embedded in a departmental structure and suffers thereby. As a program, and not a department, INTL faculty do not receive Faculty Senate representation, the T & P process is fraught with difficulty, and it is given very little visibility on the LCWA website. INTL, with six faculty members, almost 200 majors and over 70 minors is considered too small for departmental status (like Classics, Religious Studies, German, Philosophy, Hospitality and Tourism Management, or the recently created Department of Finance). **A Policy was put into effect which defined a Department as having at least 8 roster faculty or faculty lines. This Policy also grand-fathered in the departments previously mentioned as allowed to remain departments without conforming to the Policy. It is hard**

not to think that this Policy was created specifically for International Studies. This discriminatory policy also affects the allocation of resources. While International Studies has almost half the degree seeking students in the School, it has a smaller budget than most departments and programs. This severely limits faculty development and co-curricular programs for INTL majors. Both Dean and Provost made clear to the INTL faculty that resources will not be allocated based upon the number of majors – nor would there be any reallocation of resources as departments or programs grew or shrank. Our only possibility of increase of resources would be raising external funding.

Up until spring 2015, all the statistics related to International Studies were reported as part of something called “International and Intercultural Studies” which included – International Studies and Asian Studies (which is basically Asian languages faculty). This is the reason we do not report the data provided by Institutional Research. It does not correctly reflect the effort of this program. Not until spring 2015 are the classes or faculty effort grouped together as “International Studies”, and even here there are gross problems. For example, the effort and classes of Beatriz Maldonado, Bird who holds a joint appointment in International Studies and Economics, are all reported with the Economics Department.

The third problem the program has been struggling with is the Degreeworks system. Degreeworks is apparently incapable of accommodating our major in a number of ways. This has led to our major being cited for excessive “exceptions” even though these “exceptions” are students following the requirements of the major. Over the last three years some improvement has been made particularly in accommodating special topics courses and the language requirement for International studies majors, but it seems rather silly to have to petition for an exception on your record when one is following the Faculty Senate approved curriculum of your major. The inability of Degreeworks to properly reflect our students’ progress in their major is a significant cause of the frustration and dissatisfaction they experience. We are told not to expect any improvement.

With the transition of leadership in the program next year, it will be important for the Dean and Provost to support the new INTL director, Malte Pehl. A successful transition will go a long way towards assuring the faculty and others at the College of the continued existence of the Program in the absence of its establishment as a department.

Assessment

This is the second year of our reformed program assessment. Data is now gathered from courses where the great majority of the students are actually majors – INTL 350 and INTL 495 – as well as study abroad, which is uniquely an integral part of our major curriculum. It certainly is too early to conclude anything based up the data collected thus far, but data collected with the IDI study abroad survey is suggestive with regard to the decision of the program faculty to restrict certain affiliate study abroad programs.

Advising

With only six faculty members and more than 250 majors and minors, advising is a challenge for the Program. The major is complex – five concentrations which are in effect like five different majors, with their own specific language and study abroad requirements. The minor is less complex now that electives have been specified in the catalog, but so many special topics and

study abroad courses can apply to make it complex again and require multiple meeting with faculty advisors. Some of the burden has been shouldered by faculty associated with the program who have particular expertise in concentrations. Lei Jin, Yoshiki Chikuma, Simon Lewis, Bill Olejniczak,

and Martine Cuvillier-Hiers, Director of Comparative Literature, have been most helpful. This still leaves a significant burden on INTL faculty especially when minors are factored in. You will notice that the Program director currently advises all the INST minors and still INTL faculty have significant advising loads. Advising INTL majors and INST minors requires a good knowledge of the curriculum of each of the concentrations, the languages required by them, and the study abroad opportunities and restrictions for each. Faculty should have a multidisciplinary background – particularly some familiarity with the social sciences and history.

Curriculum

The most significant curricular change this year was the moving of INTL 350 from being a requirement of each individual concentration to a major requirement. In effect, each concentration was reduced by 3 credit hours from 21 cr. to 18 cr. and the major requirement increased from 12 to 15 cr. The minor (INST) courses are now better aligned with the course in the major – particularly the Europe area.

Plans for the coming year include continuing work on one or two new concentrations for the INTL major. It was always anticipated when the INTL major was first conceived that there would be expansion in both the regionally focused and thematically focused areas. Student desire for a Middle East or Near East Concentration is expressed often. Students have also expressed an interest in a more general “Global Issues” concentration – particularly for students who are not settled on a particular region of the world but have a passion for international affairs.

Teaching

As is befitting of an inter- and multi- disciplinary program, the faculty in International Studies contributed to the curriculum of a number of departments as they fulfilled their obligation to the International Studies curriculum. INTL faculty taught International Studies, Political Science, and Economics, and Religious Studies courses. They also contributed to the FYE and Honors programs. Unlike most other majors, the faculty contributing to the INTL major go far beyond the roster of INTL faculty in the program and thus it is difficult to measure in the same way one would most other majors (courses from 26 departments and programs in 4 Schools). A list of courses the college offered that students in all concentrations could take to satisfy the major is included later in the report.

Study Abroad

INTL is one of a very few majors that require students to study or intern abroad – therefore, 100% of graduating INTL majors have studied abroad. INTL formally specifies what programs are acceptable for study abroad. Students are limited to certain affiliate programs – CIEE, IES, ISEP, SFS School for Field Study, Arcadia University, Danish Institute for Study Abroad, IFSA-Butler, SACI – Studio Arts Centers International, SIT, and University of Southern Mississippi, CYA – College Year in Athens – all College semester, summer, and bi-lateral programs that are three

weeks or longer in duration. This eliminates all for-profit programs and makes monitoring and evaluating study abroad for our students much easier. We have started to evaluate the study abroad experience, while also receiving feedback on the quality of programs, through the administering of the Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) that assesses intercultural sensitivity and global awareness.

Sarah Wuigk, our administrative coordinator is continuing to develop INTL internships abroad. She is also developing a system to monitor when and where INTL students study abroad and procedures for better advising for study abroad.

INTL Students

INTL majors follow a common set of requirements for 15 hours of the major. The other 18 consist of courses in their concentrations. At the end of spring 2018, there were **180** declared majors: **83 students were in the Europe concentration; 44 in the Latin America and the Caribbean concentration; 42 in the Asia concentration; 6 in the Africa concentration and 5 in the International Comparative Literature concentration.**

In spring 2018, 45 INTL majors (25% of all INTL majors), were in the Honors College – a number of majors second only to Biology’s 92 (13% of all Biology majors). 54% of all Honors College students in LCWA major in International Studies

The INST minor comprises 18 credit hours of which nine are taken in core required courses and nine are taken as electives which are directed toward a specific non-US geographic area or three INTL courses at the 200 or 300 level. In spring, 2017 there were **70** minors.

An “INTL Get Together” for all INTL majors was set for September 12, 2017 at the President’s Glebe Street Garden, but was preempted by Hurricane Irma. The event was rescheduled for October 24, 2017 – same place, same time. Faculty from the International Studies program as well as affiliate faculty from all across the campus attended. This is one of the few ways that students in our interdisciplinary major can all get to know one another.

INTL Graduates

A total of 52 students graduated with the INTL degree during the 2017-2018 academic year. This graduating class of INTL majors had a cumulative GPA of 3.407 and a GPA in the major of 3.45.

International Studies Alumni

With only eight years in existence, the International Studies Program does not have an old, established alumni. However, in a relatively short period of time it has graduated 349 students. While they may not be established in their life careers, what we have found is that they are pursuing their dreams and doing many interesting things.
